

SCOPE OF PHARMACY

The profession of Pharmacy is a noble profession, which has been practised since many centuries. It is the art and science of preparing and dispensing of medications and providing drug related information to the public. Pharmacists are considered as a vital link

between the medical profession and patients. The practice of pharmacy profession involves:-

- Research and Discovery of new drugs.
- Manufacturing of bulk drugs.
- Designing and formulating different dosage forms like tablets, capsules, injections, ointments, inhalations etc.
- Quality assurance of various products.
- Proper labelling and storage of medicines.
- Interpretation of prescriptions and proper dispensing of medicines.
- Patient counselling.
- Pharmacovigilance including assessing patient compliance and monitoring and reporting adverse drug reactions etc.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR PHARMACISTS

Graduates in Pharmacy, with their indepth knowledge of Pharmaceutical Science can work in various facets of the profession like:

- Research and development of new drugs and formulations.
- Production of bulk drugs and formulations and cosmetics
- Quality control of pharmaceuticals and cosmetics
- Community Pharmacy
- Hospital & Clinical Pharmacy
- Drug enforcement departments (Drug Inspectors)
- Medical Transcription
- Clinical Research
- Regulatory Affairs

Pharmacy graduates can also pursue higher studies leading to post-graduate or doctoral degrees and work as teachers and research scientists. There is tremendous scope for pharmacists to work abroad in countries like USA, UK, Australia and the Gulf region.

ADMISSION NORMS

ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

(I) ACADEMIC

a) **B. Pharm**

Candidates should have passed the higher secondary examinations of the Government of Kerala or any other course treated as equivalent to with Physics, Chemistry as compulsory subjects and Biology/Maths/Biotechnology or Computer Science as optional subjects. Candidates should have obtained a minimum of 50% marks for the optional subjects and 50% marks aggregate for all the 3 subjects put together. However candidates who have passed their qualifying examination from outside the state of Kerala shall produce the certificate of recognition and equivalency of qualifying examination from Kerala University of Health Science, Thrissur. This should be furnished at the time of admission. Eligibility for admission to the candidates belonging to OBC, OEC, SC/ST will be as per the requirements of the Kerala University of Health Science, Thrissur.

b) Pharm. D

A pass in any of the following examinations.

(i) 10+2 examination with Physics and Chemistry as compulsory subjects along with one of the following subjects: Mathematics or Biology.

(ii) A pass in D. Pharm course from an institution approved by the Pharmacy Council of India under section 12 of the Pharmacy A ct.

(iii) Any other qualification approved by the Pharmacy Council of India equivalent to any of the above examinations.

c) M. Pharm

A candidate who has passed B. Pharm degree examinations from Kerala University of Health Sciences or an examination equivalent to of any other universities recognised by Kerala University of Health Sciences with not less than a total of 50 % marks for the B. Pharm degree examination shall be eligible for admission to M.Pharm degree course. The candidate should have undergone B.Pharm degree course in an institution approved by PCI.

(II) AGE

Applicants should have completed 17 years of age on 31/12/ 2021. Self attested copy of relevant page of school record namely SSLC/CBSE/ICSC certificate showing the date of birth/copy of the birth certificate from appropriate authority should be furnished along with the application attested by gazetted officer or head of the institution where student had studied.

(III) NATIONALITY

Candidates must be a citizen of India.

(IV) LATERAL ENTRY (B. Pharm)

Candidates who have passed two year D.Pharm with not less than 50% marks are eligible for admission to the second year of the course.

(V) FEE STRUCTURE

As per Govt. directions.

HOW TO APPLY

The candidates shall apply online for all the courses mentioned above. The link for making online application is available in the respective pages of the member colleges in the prospectus. All the candidates shall fill all required column including the column for DD number of application fee.

The application after submission shall be printed and submitted to respective college with DD for Rs. 1000 (Rupees thousand only) along with necessary documents to the concerned college. The DD shall be taken in favour of KSSPCMA payable at Chalakudy, Thrissur.

NOTE:

1. Online application form will be considered only if the hard copy is submitted to the respective college, with required fee.

2. Application forms along with valid DD of Rs. 1000 in favour of

KSSPCMA payable at Chalakudy, Thrissur will only be considered.

- 3. Incomplete or delayed application form will not be accepted.
- 4. The last date submitting online application is 20th August 2021.

The hard copy of application form along with DD should reach the concerned college on or before 20th August 2021. Application form submitted (online/hardcopy) to the colleges after the above mentioned cut off date will not be considered by the member colleges.

4. Candidates should enclosed a self addressed envelope (25x12 cm. size) with Indian postage stamp/stamps sufficient for sending the selection memo by registered post with set of application form Note:

i. Applications received after date will not be accepted.

- ii. Incomplete applications will be rejected.
- iii. Candidates should not enclose any original certificate along with the applications

SELECTION PROCEDURE

Preparation of common merit list and allotment of candidates:

Admissions will be on the basis of marks obtained by the candidates for Physics and Chemistry in the qualifying examination.

The marks obtained by the candidates in the relevant subjects in the qualifying examination conducted by various boards or authority of other states shall be equated with the marks obtained by the candidates in the same subjects in the qualifying examination conducted by the Director of HSE, Kerala. Marks obtained by the candidates under various streams of examinations such as HSE in Kerala/CBSE/ICSE etc. will be subject to the process of normalisation.

Explanation: Under the method of normalisation, the highest mark obtained by students of various boards in each subject shall be equated to the highest mark obtained by the students of the Kerala Higher Secondary Examination in that subject and the relative marks obtained by other students in that subject shall be determined accordingly.

Illustration: If the highest marks secured by the student of the Kerala State HSE, in Physics is 100 and the highest mark secured by a student on any other board in the same subject is 90, both the highest marks will be considered to be equal to 100, if a student of the other board secures 60 marks in Physics when the highest mark in Physics in the same board is 90, the 60 marks will be considered to be equal to 66.66 marks as arrived at below. $100 \ge 66.66\%$

Those candidates who have passed the qualifying examination of any state other than Kerala, will be treated at par with those students who have passed the Higher Secondary Exam of this state.

RESERVATION OF SEATS

Minority institutions will have the freedom to fix appropriate reservations to their community. Details are available in the respective annexure of the respective colleges.

FEE CONCESSION

Fee concession will be given subject to a maximum of 50 % of the fees payable by other regular candidates in the respective Colleges, to candidates whose family income is less than Rs. 100000/- per year. This benefit will be given to a maximum of 3 seats in each course and subject to the passing of all continued examinations and continued good conduct. The Management will have the freedom to verify the family income and if found incorrect appropriate action deemed fit will be taken by the management.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE (FOR B. PHARM, M. PHARM & PHARM. D)

i. Originals of all certificates/documents enclosed with the application should be submitted at the time of admission to the respective colleges.

ii. The candidates shall pay the fees at the time of admission

iii. The responsibility of the association and office of the controller of selection and admissions is limited to the conduct of the Selection and Admission Procedure, publication of the ranks secured by each candidate, preparation of common merit list and allotment of the candidate to the respective Colleges.

iv. Physical fitness certificate, conduct certificate and transfer certificate originals should be submitted at the time of admission to the respective colleges.

REFUND / ADJUSTMENT OF FEES

Fees paid will be refunded as per PCI norms. In the case of SC/ST candidates they should remit their fee to the concerned college at the time of admission. The same will be refunded in case the Govt. pay the fees to the college or assure the payment of the same.

OTHER INFORMATION

i. No request for change of selection processes will be entertained, nor the controller of selection and admissions will entertain enquiries with regard to date of publication of the result.

ii. Any other item not specifically covered in this prospectus will be decided by the concerned authority and his decision shall be final.

iii. If any candidate discontinues the course after closing admissions as notified by the controller of selection and admissions, the candidate has to pay liquidated damages to the time of full fee of the course.

PROGRAMME CONTENT AND SCHEME OF EXAMINATION

B. Pharm (PCI Syllabus)

Duration of the program

The course of study for B. Pharm shall extend over a period of eight semesters (four academic years) and six semesters (three academic years) for lateral entry students.

Attendance

A candidate is required to put in at least 80 % attendance in individual courses considering theory and practical separately. The candidate shall complete the prescribed course satisfactorily to be eligible to appear for the respective examinations.

Sessional Exams

Two Sessional exams will be conducted for each theory / practical course as per the schedule fixed by the college. The average marks of two sessional exams will be computed for internal assessment .Sessional exam will be conducted for 30 marks for theory and will be computed for 15 marks. Similarly sessional exam for practical will be conducted for 40 marks and will be computed for 10 marks.

End semester examinations

The End Semester Examinations for each theory and practical course through semesters I to VIII shall be conducted by the university except for the subjects with asterix symbol (*) in the table for which examinations shall be conducted by the subject experts at college level and the marks/grades shall be submitted to the university. Pharm.D (Doctor of Pharmacy) Duration

The duration of the course shall be six academic years (five years of study and one year of internship or residency) full time with each academic year spread over a period of not less than 200 working days. The period of six years duration is divided into two phases – Phase I – consisting of first, second, third, fourth and the fifth academic year. Phase II – consisting of internship or residency training during the sixth year involving posting in specialty units. It is a phase of training wherein a student is exposed to actual pharmacy practice or clinical pharmacy services and acquires skill under supervision so that he or she may become capable of functioning independently.

Attendance

A candidate is required to put in at least 80% attendance in individual courses considering theory and practical separately. The candidate shall complete the prescribed course satisfactorily to be eligible to appear for the respective examinations.

Sessional Exams

There will be at least three sessional examinations during each academic year and the highest aggregate of any two performances will form the basis of calculating sessional marks.

Yearly University Examination

The university examinations shall be held at the end of each academic year.

WORKING DAYS AND CLASS HOURS

Guidance and Counselling in the college is a professional activity based on certain well-accepted principles.

Admission Counselling:- This is an interactive process through which new students and their parents/ guardians are oriented to the campus culture and academic practices followed at the college. **Personal Counselling:-** Counselling is offered in an unconditional, non-judgemental and confidential manner, to students, seeking help with personal and academic difficulties. Guidance is also provided to improve academic performance by reviewing study techniques and time management practices. The centre also serves as channel for student's grievances.

CAMPUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

Nirmala Campus is proud of its eco-friendly serene and peaceful environment. Defacing any part of the campus is treated as an offence. Students have to abide by the rules and regulations of the college framed in accordance with the norms set by the government, the university and the authorities of the college.

A. BEHAVIOUR AND DISCIPLINE

Deeply committed to upholding value system, the college expects its students to conduct themselves in a worthy manner in their dress, demeanor and sense of discipline.

- All students are bound to obey the rules, regulations and instructions given by the Principal and maintain the decorum of the institution.
- > Students should be prompt and punctual.
- They should be clean and decorous in dress, language and behaviour.
- When a student meets a member of the teaching staff of the college within the campus or outside , it is a matter of politeness that he/she should greet him/ her.
- Students should be seated in their respective classrooms at the stroke of the bell.

- When the teacher enters the class room students must remain standing until they are directed to sit, or till the teacher takes his/her seat.
- When the attendance roll is called, each one must rise and answer to his/ her name or register number.
- Perfect silence should be maintained in the college during class hours.
- Students should keep with them text books and note books required for class they attend.
- Every student must have the prescribed laboratory records, accessories etc. required for the lab.
- No student shall enter or leave a class when a session is in progress without permission of the teacher.
- No student is allowed to go outside the campus without the permission of the Principal during class hours.
- Movements of students in the corridors of the college buildings during lecture hours or sitting on the steps of the staircases is not permitted. Action will be taken against students found loitering about in the corridors and making noise.
- Students are expected to make use of the library during free periods.
- Ragging is prohibited by law. Students shall not indulge in any such activities.
- Smoking, alcoholic drinks, tobacco, Pan parag etc. are strictly prohibited in the college campus.
- > Political activity of any kind is banned in the campus.
- Students shall prudently avoid bad company, which leads to failure in study, character and life.
- Use of mobile phones is strictly prohibited in the campus and in the class rooms. Teachers can impound such mobile phones in case of violation.
- Students should maintain a sense of decorum and discipline at all times, both inside and outside the campus. Those

who are guilty of serious misconduct or whose presence is detrimental to the order and discipline on the campus are liable to be expelled.

- No member shall throw any waste material on the ground or floor, but shall drop them in the waste baskets and bins provided for the purpose.
- Use of internet by the students in the campus is expected to be for their academic enrichment.
- Separate common rooms and toilets are provided for ladies and gents. They are strongly directed to use only the rooms and toilets allotted for them separately. They can use the rooms allotted for them for taking meals. Class rooms, corridors and stair cases should not be used for that purpose.
- Strict disciplinary action will be taken against students bringing outsiders to the college campus without prior permission of the principal.
- Students are forbidden to organise or attend any meeting in the college campus, circulate any notice or petition of any kind, display posters, banners or boards, use mega phones / loud speakers and paste or write anything in the college campus and premises without the permission of the Principal. No student, on any account, shall make chalk or pencil mark or drawing on walls, black board and furniture.
- Any damage done to college properties will be liable for compensation.

They are advised to check the college notice board daily. **DRESS CODE**

- The student pharmacist must be in professional attire, which includes clean uniform and identity cards.
- Every student must wear clean lab coats and girls must put up their hair in the practical labs.
- Students are expected to wear their uniforms on all days except Wednesdays.

- Students should avoid wearing tight, transparent or revealing cloths. Sleeveless clothes, round neck T-shirts, and T-shirts with slogans/inscriptions are not allowed. Boys are expected to be in full pants and clean shirts. Lowwaisted pants with several large pockets are not allowed.
- Girls are expected to dress modestly. They are not allowed to wear short salwar/kurta. Girls are expected to wear salwar and kameez with dupatta.

B. HOSPITAL WARD ROUNDS RULES AND REGULATION (Pharm. D Students)

1. Regarding Uniform

a) During all ward round college uniform is must.

b) Students should wear black shoe.

c) Specially designed lab coat should be worn during hospital ward rounds.

2. Strict discipline in hospital.

a) No talking during ward rounds with your colleagues.

b) Boys to have clean shave with neat hair cutting.

c) Girls to put-up the hair.

d) Timing for hospital ward round as per time table is to be followed.

3. Case Presentation

a) During case presentations maintain strict silence.

C. ATTENDANCE

Attendance shall be marked at the beginning of each period by the teacher engaging the period. Late-comers, therefore, though permitted to attend classes by the teacher concerned, will not be given attendance or marked late at the discretion of the teacher concerned.

Students absenting themselves in any of the class / day for any reason should bring leave letter from their Parents / Guardians / Wardens mentioning the specific reason for absence and submit the same to the class teacher.

- Attendance is inevitable on the occasions of co-curricular or extra-curricular activities. In case of absence, their parents should report the matter directly to the authorities concerned.
- At the end or the beginning of each month percentage of attendance will be put up on the General Notice Board showing the number of days of attendance lost by each student till then.
- The students are required to put in at least 80 % attendance in individual subjects considering theory and practical separately. Leave application will be considered only if the overall attendance is above 75%.

LEAVE REGULATIONS

- 1. A student requiring leave for only an hour or a portion of an hour must apply for it in writing to the concerned teacher before the period begins.
- 2. A student requiring leave for a whole day must apply for it in writing to the Principal through the class teacher in advance and should be attested by parent/guardian/warden.
- 3. Students who are absent from classes for two weeks or more continuously without written permission of the Principal will be considered to have left the college.
- 4. Application for sick leave for more than three days should be supported by a medical certificate.
- 5. Application for leave of absence may be rejected by the Principal/teacher, if its genuineness is not satisfied.

D. EXAMINATIONS

1. Students should have a minimum of 80 % attendance in theory and practical subjects separately in order to appear for the university examinations.

- 2. Uniform is must on all examination dates.
- 3. Students must attend all sessionals examinations.
- 4. Students should enter the examination hall
 - a) 15 minutes before the starting of sessional examination.
 - b) 45 minutes before the starting of University examination.
- 5. Students are not allowed to leave the examination hall before the stipulated time.
- 6. Exchanges of scale, pencil, erasers etc. are not allowed in examination hall.
- 7. Malpractice of any kind will be seriously dealt with.
- 8. Bringing mobile phones to the examination hall will be considered as malpractice.
- 9. Students involving in any kind of malpractice will not be allowed to write further examinations.
- 10. The names of those involved in malpractice will be displayed in the notice board.

E. GENERAL RULES FOR LIBRARY

- 1. Students should follow the library rules.
- 2. All the students are entitled to use the library for reference and for taking books on loan.
- 3. Strict silence should be maintained in the library and its premises.
- 4. User's personal belongings are not allowed to be taken inside the library.
- 5. One student can take 2 books on loan at a time. Book should be returned on or before the date stamped last on the book.
- 6. Reference book will not be lend out but they may be referred in the library.

- 7. Before getting books and other reading materials students should produce their identity cards.
- 8. Readers will be responsible for any damage caused to books or any other property. Those who damage books, shall be fined in proportion to the damage. To be safe, when a book is issued to a reader, he/she must point out to the librarian any defect noted concerning the book. Lend books should be kept in good condition.
- 9. Students are not allowed to sub-lend the library books.
- 10. Students shall not engage in conversation in any part of the library so as to cause annoyance to any other reader.
- 11. Students shall not write upon, damage or mark any book belonging to the library.
- 12. Upon any infringement of the library rules members shall forfeit the privileges of use and membership of the library.
- 13. The students caught tearing pages/ stealing of books will be suspended forthwith from using the library facilities and the college will initiate further disciplinary action against them.

LOAN OF BOOKS

1. Members are eligible for borrowing books from the library as follows:-

a) Students - 2 Books

b) Teaching Staff - 8 Books

c) Non teaching staff - 2 Books

- 2. The loan period of books is generally 10 days. Books should be returned on or before the date stamped last on the book. If the due date happens to be a holiday, books need to be returned only on the next working day.
- 3. A book will be issued to the member against production of borrower's card with the I.D. card, failing which the library staff can refuse to issue books to him/her.

- 4. An overdue charge of Rs. 1/- per day per volume shall be collected as fine for the first 10 days and thereafter Rs. 5/- per volume per day shall be levied.
- 5. The librarian reserves the right to recall any book from any member at any time.
- 6. The librarian may shorten the loan period if the books are on special demand.
- 7. Books loaned may be renewed for further period provide no other reader has reserved the same.
- 8. The members are responsible for the library borrower card issued to them. Loss of borrower card should be reported to the library immediately.
- 9. If any overdue fine amount exist, must be cleared at each end semester/year before the commencement of University Exam.

F. FEE REGULATIONS

- 1. The fee shall be paid for the full year on the day of admission. Fee once paid will not be refunded.
- 2. Absence with or without leave from the college shall not be an excuse for non-payment of fee on the prescribed date.

G. MOBILE PHONES ARE BANNED INSIDE THE CAMPUS

In reference with Govt. circular No. 30115/K3/09/ H.Ed. Dept, mobile phones are strictly banned inside the campus.

H. PREVENTION OF RAGGING IN EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Kerala Prohibition of Ragging Act 1998

"Students found ragging directly or indirectly or abetting inside or outside an educational institution are liable for imprisonment for a term which may extend upto 2 years with a fine which may be upto Rs. 10000 .Depending upon the severity of the case, the guilty can be either suspended or dismissed and can also be debarred from gaining admission in any institution for five years".

(1) Definition

"Ragging" means display of disorderly conduct, doing any act which causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raise apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to a student in any educational institution and includes :-

a) teasing, abusing of, playing practical jokes on or causing hurt to such student,

b) asking the student to do any act or perform something which the student will not in the ordinary course willingly do.

(2) Prohibition of Ragging

Ragging inside or outside the educational institution is prohibited.

(3) Penalty for Ragging

Whoever directly or indirectly commits, participates in, abets or propagates ragging inside, or outside, the educational institution, shall, on conviction ,be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to 2 years and shall also be liable to a fine which may extend to ten thousand rupees.

(4) Dismissal of Student

Any student convicted of an offence under section 4 shall be dismissed from the educational institution, and such student shall not be admitted in any other educational institution for a period of three years from the date of the order of such dismissal.

(5) Suspension of Student

(1) Whenever any student or, as the case may be, the parents or guardian or a teacher of an educational institution complains, in writing, of ragging to the head of the educational institution, the head of that educational institution shall, without prejudice to the foregoing provisions, within seven days of the receipt of the complaint , enquire in to the matter mentioned in the complaint and, if, prima facie, it is found true, suspend the student who is accused of the offence , and shall, immediately, forward the complaint to the police station having jurisdiction over the area in which the educational institution is situated for further action. (2) Where, on enquiry by the head of the educational institution, it is proved that there is no substance prima facie in the complaint received under sub-section(1), he shall intimate the fact, in writing, to the complainant.

(6) Abetting

If the head of the institution refuses to take action in the manner described under section six or is negligent in initiating any steps ,he is to be treated as one abetting the crime and is liable to be punished under section four. As per the orders of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, ragging in educational institutions is a criminal offense. In order to implement the Supreme Court orders, an anti-ragging cell has been constituted in our college and any complaints regarding ragging may immediately be brought to the notice of any of the members of the cell.

ANTI-RAGGING SQUAD

Anti-Ragging Squard is constituted, consisting of the following under Regulation 6C of the said AICTE Regulation 2009 to maintain vigit, oversight and Patrolling function and shall always remain mobile, alert and active throughout to ensure that not a single incidence of ragging creeps in the College or Hostels or anywhere and will adopt such measures as may be necessary to crub the menance of ragging

The Squad shall always initiate precautionary measures in visiting all the premises of the college to avert occurrence of any ragging in any form form or shape. It shall submit a report to the Anti Ragging Committee about the occurrence of any such incidence immediately.

Another promising field is getting employed in production, research, quality analysis, quality assurance etc. Another option of students is to get enrolled in post graduate specialisations like M.Pharm, MBA, Post Baccueaularete Pharm D, PG Diploma in Clinical Trials.

Training and Placement Cell is offering mentoring services to students to focus on their interests. They are given proper guidance and information of career aspects like Production Executive, Quality Analyst, Research and Development, Marketing, Pre Clinical Trials, Clinical Trials, Remote Pharmacist, Medical Writing, Medical Transcription etc. Students are given opportunity for interaction with Qualified Faculty from Industries and Research Organisations to mould themselves with the desired job. For the purpose of identifying their interests we have collected data from among students and have introduced a Placement book. According to the preferences in the data on-campus/outside placements are scheduled. For attaining the goals, students are given training programs which ensure the development of Personality and Communication Skills. Students interested in pursuing higher studies are given training session and mock tests for National level Pharmacy aptitude test like Graduate Pharmacy Aptitude Test (GPAT). Students are also exposed to online (GPAT) mock tests conducted by national organisations. Our institute organises seminars by Eminent Academicians from Foreign Universities for the students to acquainted about their possibilities for higher studies abroad. Students are also allowed to participate in International Educational Exhibitions to familiarize the procedures for filing towards immigration to the foreign countries for higher studies.

Final Year B.Pharm students are being offered one month training at reputed pharmaceutical industries/NABH accredited hospitals mentioned in the table.
