

SELF-MEDICATION PRACTISES: A SERIOUS THREAT.

his study is an investigation on Self medication, defined as the 'use of a product without medical prescription or consultation in order to prevent or treat a disease or a symptom or to promote health'. The main issues in self-medication are improper usage of resources, OTC abuse, pathogen resistance and potential side effects with prolonged suffering in many of the cases.

Self-medication is the practice of using medicines without prior medical consultation and proper knowledge about the right indication, dosage and duration of treatment. It is a common practice worldwide to opt self-medication as their first choice in most illness episodes. According to the World Health Organisation 'self-medication is the use of drugs to treat self-diagnosed disorders or symptoms, or the intermittent or continued use of a prescribed drug for chronic or recurrent diseases or symptoms'. The society prefers self-medication at times due to easiness and time saving with saving costs, Selfmedication has its own consequences, which can cause unexpected financial burden as it may produce unintended reactions that may further require medical attention. Many studies have reported adverse reactions with commonly used prescription drugs and OTC products, so their inappropriate use may result in irrational drug therapy and delay in seeking medical care and sometimes which can cause side effects.

In addition, several studies conducted on self-medication showed the wide usage of insufficient or improper uses of antibiotics and other prescription drugs. The prevalence of self-medication depends on many factors like education, gender, socioeconomic status and availability of medicines. Problems of self-medication: Inappropriate self-medication, incorrect or a delayed diagnosis of a severe medical condition, financial load on the patients and their families, The

patient is exposed to unwanted medicines that may cause a harm, home remedies and herbs which are not completely risk free may worsen the patient's condition. A prospective, cross -sectional questionnaire based study was carried out among 450 people selected by random sampling in the Muvattupuzha, Kerala, region. The main objectives of this study were to find out the reason and type of illness for which people selfmedicate, prevalence of self-medication during pregnancy, self-medication with antibiotics and pharmacist's approach while dispensing the OTC drugs. Study showed that self-medication was a common practice among the population and the commonly used medicines were analgesics, cold and cough relievers. Self-medication with antibiotics was also reported. Though self-medication was a prominent practice, people were well aware about its implications in pregnancy and lactation. There was no statistically significant difference in self-medication pattern between different age groups but significant between males and females among which females showed more practice of self-medication.

It would be safe if the people who are using the medications are aware about the various aspects of medicines. As a major part of the healthcare system, duties of the pharmacist have been changing over the past decade, with increasing self-medication worldwide. Pharmacist plays a valuable role in identifying, solving, and preventing drug related problems and thus improving patient outcome and quality of life as he can act as an efficient communicator by directly interacting with the patients and asking key questions to know their understanding and pass on relevant information to him or her. Pharmacists are uniquely trained to assist the patient and hence should educate them regarding the safe use of medicines, help or direct them in the selection of appropriate drug therapy and should make them aware about the circumstances under which a physician should be consulted before patients embark upon independent self-care.


INDRODUCTION

Snakebite envenomation is an important public health problem faced by the tropical countries with India, the worst affected in terms of mortality and morbidity. In spite of increasing reports of other snake species causing envenomation, the existing research and management strategies including antivenom are still focused on the "Big Four" species- Russel's viper, saw scaled viper, common krait and spectacled cobra. Pit vipers as a group are being increasingly reported to cause human bites from different parts of the country. In the wake of these reports it was felt a need to study the clinical manifestations and abnormalities in laboratory parameters along with mortality figures (if any) in proven pit viper bites.

RESULTS


Out of 144 cases of snakebites reported to the hospital, pit vipers were responsible of which 12 cases were included applying the inclusion criteria

Hump nose pit viper was predominantly seen in the Muvattupuzha & Angamaly region of central Kerala.this may be related to the diverse geographical area of grass lands and mountain regions, Rubber plantations

CLINICAL PRESENTATION OF HUMP NOSE PIT VIPER



A definite bite mark was observed in 75% of cases. Transient bleeding from the bite site was observed in 16.7% of cases while others did not have any bleeding at all. The most common clinical outcome of HNV bites in Involvement of pain at bite site. Nausea

and vomiting were seen in 4 cases whereas abdominal pain was observed in 2 cases. No bleeding manifestations were observed Out of 12 cases, 8 had deranged lab parameters of coagulation at some point of time during hospital stay though none showed any clinical evidence of bleeding. On direct mixing with pooled normal plasma, (fresh frozen plasma the deranged coagulation parameters got corrected in all cases. The mean delay in onset of coagulopathy was 24.3 + 8.4 hours after the bite. The mean duration of

INR predominantly raised in 8 patients on the 2 nd day of admission with a mean of 3.8, yet none of them had any bleeding manifestations. With regard to renal function 4 patients met the criteria for acute kidney injury (AKI). The patient with AKI had a normalized serum creatinine after 4 days of the bite.

TREATMENT PROVIDED

coagulopathy was 5.4±2.95 days

Anti snake venom treatment were given as the first line agent , Mean use of 15 vials (+_8.2 vials) were used to treat the patients. Out of which 58.3% showed coagulopathy symptoms and marked elevation of the INR .Fresh frozen plasma was used in all those patients who showed coagulopathy and was proven effective to correct the deranged value

DISCUSSION

it is now considered a venomous snake with the capacity to develop severe envenoming.

. Local pain and swelling are the most consistent effects of envenomation. A haemorrhagic blister at the bite site and regionaltender lymphadenopathy are seen in some patients; which when present, may be useful clinical features to identify the biting snake as humpnosed viper, when the biting snake is not available for identification. However it is a nonspecific feature, and is present among many other viperid bites, as well.

Coagulopathy is the commonest and the most important systemic effect, as it is often associated with AKI, which has the potential for a fatal outcome. The primary cause for mortalityis from complications associated with coagulopathy and AKI. All whodeveloped AKI had coagulopathy, which was evident before the advent of clinical and biochemical features of AKI. It is possible that early correction of coagulopathy with FFP could prevent AKI and related adverse clinical outcomes.

Currently available antivenom is not effective for hump nosed viper bite and should not be used, whatever the severity of envenomation. Supportive and symptomatic therapy is what is usually available, apart from hemodialysis for those with AKI.

.CONCLUSION

To conclude we noticed that hump nosed viper bites are more common than expected in this part of the country. The most common clinical consequence observed was local envenomation which had instigated significant morbidity. Though it may result in significant envenomation, at present ASV is not available to treat these patients. Hence future studies needed in developing ASV effective against hump nosed pit viper.
